Show and Tell





Kenneth Heermann showed a Christmas ornament he had turned from Walnut and Maple slices to highlight **the** candle. This is a good example of inside-out turning. The candle is inserted from the bottom and can be changed to other shapes or colors easily.



Mikeal Jones sent a picture of an accident that happened while turning an open segment bowl. Seems a few pieces "went elsewhere"; becoming impossible to reconstruct the parts. Mikeal says it was not turning at a very fast rate of speed.

Program Highlights



President David Bartlett was the presenter for November. He gave the club a preview of what became the December contest: a Christmas ornament. His example was a hollowed round ornament with an insert inside. Shown above was the progression from square blank to round cylinder. David had pre-drilled the holes beforehand.

The main body begins to take shape on each end, first with a roughing gouge then with a small spindle gouge.

At the right is the finished turning, still on the lathe and ready to be removed. To condense time, sanding was left out of the loop, since it was a foregone conclusion that sanding could be done by hand and that would allow interior sanding of the holes.



Rather than risk an accidental drop, a fine tooth saw was used to separate the turning from each end. The hanger was a gold plated fish hook with the hook removed into a small hole that had been pre-drilled before beginning the turning. A small amount of cyanoacrylic glue holds the hanger in the end.



A small candle is inserted in the center of the ornament. Just a simple dowel rod turned and painted makes a great candle. At right is the comparison of the sample and the just turned ornament. It COULD be left natural and unfinished or it could be stained and finished.

Great job David. Amazing what will be the challenge turning in December!!

Thanks to everyone who has helped with our plug orders in the past. We will be asking for help getting other projects to raise funds. All ideas are welcome along with samples.
